MH Jail Diversion SAMHSA Grant

- \$1.2 Million SAMHSA Grant Awarded April 2006 through February 28, 2010
- Remaining funded programs are Pre Trial MH Coordinator,
 MH treatment (ACT, FICM, Gaudenzia Gibson House)
- Jail Diversion program continues post SAMHSA Grant!
- Continuing treatment improvement efforts
 - Seeking Safety / Trauma Informed care
 - Improved response to Co-occurring
 - Consumer engagement

Success of SAMHSA Grant

- Improved coordination and collaboration among grant partners: Prison Staff, APO, DA, PD, Pre-Trial, Courts, Police, MH Providers

Overview of BJA Grant

- Dauphin County MH/ID awarded a Category II, Planning and Implementation Grant of 250,000 in September of 2009 for funding period beginning 1/1/10 for a 30-Month period.
- Implement MH Court, Expand Jail Diversion, Develop SMI Jail/Prison Re- Entry
- In 2009, 18% of BJA applications received awards (43/246)
- 43 grantees in 30 states make up the 2009 cohort
- Grant type:
 - Planning: 10 grantees
 - Planning and Implementation: 21 grantees
 - Expansion: 12 grantees

Grant Components

Forensic Re-Entry Program

- Target Population is adults with mental illness who are eligible for release from jail/prison
- Housing Fund
- FICM/ACT
- Training

Expand Jail Diversion

- Broaden eligibility for the jail diversion program activities
- Increase Pre-Trial involvement at MDJ level court disposition
- Supervision by Pre -Trial
- Training

MH Court Basic Design

- Created new position within Pre-Trial Services for Forensic and MH collaboration and MH Court Coordination
- BJA Defined Target Population is adults with mental illness who commit or are charged with non-violent misdemeanors
- MH Court started June 17, 2010 with BJA criteria, has expanded as of March 2011 to accept more serious criminal charges
- Voluntary participation
- Builds on consumer strengths and recovery and resiliency
- Has individually developed sanctions and rewards

MH Court – How it works

- Referrals made to MH Court Team
 - Judge, DA, PD, Pre -Trial, APO, D & A, FICM
 - Some options for mitigated sentence (ARD)
 - Reduced fines and costs
- Court Team meets weekly
- MH Court proceedings and/or reinforcement hearings twice per month
- Not successful = referred to Courts for traditional sentencing
- Criminal Charge Supervision by Pre-Trial or APO, and teamed with MH FICM or ACT program case management
